OMFG! We're absolutely bursting with new growth, heading off in directions we could never have dreamed of in a million cosmological decades, spiraling off at the speed of complexity into a future impossible to predict or even blindly grope a tentative tendril toward.

In Brussels, we celebrated our 30th with a special project: Haircuts by Seniors. We were finally able to morph the salon into the pumping nightclub we had always wanted, whipping up 70s-style haircuts, imported directly from the era when our one male stylist had hair of his own. If you haven't danced to Clothilde's 1967 banger Fallait pas *écraser la queue du chat*, put down this Annual Review and jump into Spotify! What the hell is that sound after she says "hep!"...? No clue, but we can't stop grooving to it.

We also partnered with Glasgow's Wonder Fools and the Mammals of Milan to create The Book of Spin.

OMFG, only four works and five cities described and I'm already way over my word count. If you want to know what else we got up to, you'll have to keep unfolding the fronds of *Fecund!* and harvest our story.

In Riga and Québec City, we squeezed out Mammalian Droppings, our international emerging artists ensemble extravaganza, which is too complicated and too beautiful to sum up here (see page 14).

Another big'un was Enter the Gorshey, led by Ngawang Luding and beautifully represented on this cover by Toronto illustrator, Tenzin Tsering. We partnered with Nineteen59 and a massive crew of Tibetan youth to invite the public to become honorary Tibetans for the day-sharing meditations, recipes, and the once in a lifetime opportunity to Enter the Gorshey.

See you next year, when I will describe things that even I, as verdant as I am, cannot even begin to imagine.

We offset 102 metric tonnes of carbon in collaboration with CarbonZero. Also, by our metrics (see page 27 of 30 Years of Regular Ass Folks), we released approximately 780 less tonnes of carbon compared to a traditional touring model.



THE SOWING OF SOCIAL SEEDS



FECUND! (adjective): 1. Fruitful in offspring or vegetation 2. Intellectually productive or inventive to a marked degree

In *Emergence: Planning the Unplannable*, our professional development workshop for arts managers and leaders (see page 33), we take a look at the science of dynamic systems to understand the surprising, unexpected direction and growth of Mammalian Diving Reflex by sharing a way of planning for the future that is not strategic but rather, emergent.

Emergent planning allows for the unpredictable by only paying cursory attention to the most immediate goals, while focusing hard on setting parameters like: values, collaborative principles, topics, populations and people of interest. With these parameters firmly held, we flood the system-in this case: Mammalian itself and our collaborative relationships—with energy and resources, while we keep an eye on what sorts of regular connections and structures start to form.

In the early 2000s, as we shifted from script-based work to the socially-engaged interventionist work we do now, we tried a ton of different things, all under the banner of Social Acupuncture, which yielded the core Mammalian Assumptions which continue to drive the company:

- Everyone is interesting
- Everyone is generous and kind
- There is abundance in the world

It also surprisingly produced *Haircuts by Children*, which sealed a collaborative relationship with the students of Parkdale Public School in Toronto.

As we invested in these relationships, dumping in a ton of resources and producing a ton of projects, again, something unexpected emerged: The Young Mammals, a group of teens who became our resident ensemble.

Pumping a bunch more energy into those relationships not only yielded a ton of great work, but again, unexpectedly produced The Succession Model of Youth Labour Engagement (SMYLE) and its foundational set of principles:

- Succession: working with youth as if they were to inherit the company
- Collegiality: treating youth as colleagues
- Sharing of social capital: folding youth into our professional networks
- Sharing of habitus, or a feel for the cultural game, with the youth

Out of this popped unexpected relationships with other organizations and youth around the world as we reproduced the model in Germany, the UK and Italy. Most excitingly, it yielded our current core team, the people now running the show, and our massive international network of young collaborators.

We're now on the cusp of what's about to happen next. We are collaborating with a ton of emerging artists, a ton of international presenters, meeting a ton of interesting people, fostering a ton of relationships between everyone, coming up with and testing a shit-ton of new project ideas and keeping an eye on what sort of structures and relationships pop out of the ground.

What emerges next will be impossible to predict.



2025 ARTISTIC VISION & GOALS

Cultivate the blossoming of Mammalian Droppings, by:

- Continually adding presenter partners to the life-cycle, creating a self-sufficient global network of presenters and emerging artists.
- Beginning to tour and test project proposals in different locales and cultural contexts.
- Expanding and elevating project proposals through rigorous development of artistic content generation.
- Folding strong, thrilling, brain-tingling performance projects into our touring repertoire.
- Legitimizing this new form of artistic creation, offering a how-to-guide to like-minded organizations interested in this progression of the process touring model.

Reaffirm our deep roots in Toronto, by:

- Forging stronger ties with Toronto's Tibetan community through an expanded return of Enter the Gorshey.
- Building connections with Ontario-based presenters and community organizations to commence a new project development with seniors.
- Integrating with our artistic neighbours at 401 Richmond to cross-pollinate on future collaborative opportunities (if you're reading this, hit us up at unit 410!).

Branch out our new performances, by:

- Advancing our commitment to our long-term youth collaborators in Toronto, Berlin, Bochum, Milan and London via touring opportunities.
- Staging the international premiere of our most ambitious work, Everything Has Disappeared, in collaboration with U 'N I Together Productions.
- Conducting the international premieres of our site-specific performances, Everyone is Interesting and Speed-Dating with Cacti.
- Promoting our repertoire of works at international arts markets, artist talks and symposiums.

Ripen the sprouts of budding new work, by:

- Collaborating with young people and artists in Canada, South Korea and Australia on the development of My Thing \rightarrow Your Thing.
- Strengthening the creative muscles of our Humboldting! youth throughout the creation process of Playgrounds on Fire!
- Falling more and more in love with Milan, deepening our connections with long-term partners to create even more works together, following the 2024 successes of The Book of Spin and Tenacious Teen Trophies.

One of the biggest challenges in cultivating long-term engagements with youth all around the world is that we simply cannot do it alone.

We need local champions who are willing to adopt and adapt our youth engagement model, as well as open up both their organizations and their lives to local youth for long periods of time. This is a very big ask that gets even bigger when we try to convince presenters to also fold in international youth.

The solution: Opportunities for long-term youth engagement are increased when presenters get to know the youth, and discover that they are amazing people. Mammalian Droppings juggles it all with our signature elegant complexity.

We are...

- 1. Sharing how to do a site-visit.
- 2. Conceiving a ton of projects.
- 3. Sharing the skills of process touring.
- 4. Sharing the skills of international collaboration.
- 5. Building an international ensemble.
- 6. Producing a bunch of new work!

Mammalian Droppings is our international connection-producing machine. It's a little complex, so bear with us.

Phase One

Each organization gathers a group of artists to create a presentation of Adrift (see page 22), which generates dozens of ideas.



Phase Two


The ideas from *Adrift* are presented to another group of artists in a different locale, who have also done Phase One, who then choose a project idea to create.

Phase Three

Two artists from each locale travel to another locale and work with the local artist group to realize a project originally conceived in their home base.

Phase Four

Mammalian Droppings will spread to new locations, create new relationships and facilitate new work development on a monumental scale.



MAMMALIAN DROPPINGS CASE STUDY: **SNORRE'S STORYTIME**

Adrift on Avotu Street, Riga (2024)

In Riga, Latvia hosted by Homo Novus, we brought together a group of local emerging artists for Adrift on Avotu Street. One local we met, Snorre K. Svensson, runs the House of Languages. Snorre amazingly reads 200 books at a time; choosing the 17th book in his book shelf, reading one chapter and then moving to the next 17th book. In response to this beautiful insanity, we conceived Snorre's Storytime, which was selected by Québec City, Canada presenter, Recto Verso, to be realized by their Mammalian Droppings team in early 2025, led in collaboration by two of the Riga emerging artists.



EVERYTHING HAS DISAPPEARED

The seedlings of *Everything Has Disappeared* were first sprinkled back in 2018, with long-time Mammalian collaborator, Hazel Venzon and her company, U 'N I Together Productions. Following research in the Philippines, residencies in Norway and Germany with local Filipino communities, technological tests in Augmented Reality and Generative AI, the honing of our magic skills and the creation of a massive interdimensional machine, six years later, the world premiere blossomed in Winnipeg, Canada.

With the hard work of our creatives, technical team and the beautiful voices of St. Edward the Confessor's Filipino Catholic Church Choir, we were able to share a magically intricate story that considers a world without Filipinos, highlighting the importance of migrant labour through the real stories of Filipino Winnipeggers, all weaved together by the Indigenous Filipino philosophies of *Kapwa* and *Pakikiramdam*—without you, I am nothing.

Everything Has Disappeared will proliferate across the world, with an international premiere set for 2025.

ENTER THE GORSHEY

In Tibetan, "Gorshey" translates to "dance circle," a centuries old tradition where people in vibrant costumes form concentric circles and dance together for many hours. It's beautiful to watch-and even more beautiful to take part in. It is quite daunting for an outsider to dive into such a thing. This cultural dichotomy was fertile ground for our socially-engaged practice.

Ngawang (our resident Tibetan), along with local Tibetan youth and community partners designed a journey to guide non-Tibetan audiences through Tibetan culture, providing the cultural knowledge, specificity and welcoming spirit to become an honorary Tibetan for the day. Going through various stations, each led by the youth, audiences learned the history of Tibet, how to make delicious momos, the meaning behind traditional clothing, experience a guided meditation, and of course, a crash-course in Gorshey.

Once all stations are complete—and only then—the audiences received their Khata of honour and an exclusive invite to Enter the Gorshey, joining the ongoing communal dance with confidence and cultural understanding.



EVERYONE IS INTERESTING

New work can sprout out of the most bizarre circumstances. With City of Toronto's Doors Open, we were tasked with creating a bespoke guided tour. We planned to bring Home Tours, where we knock on strangers' doors with an audience and ask for a tour of the strangers' homes, to the highly sought after neighbourhood on Toronto Islands. That was until a tiny contingent of the neighbourhood's mega-NIMBYs got word of it and we had to pivot. Fast.

How could we present a guided tour of Toronto Islands, with no physical landmarks? We'll host a guided tour of the Island visitors, of course! Thus, Everyone is Interesting was born.

Tour groups embark on a series of intimate, unusual and joyful experiences with random members of the public to prove that all people are complex, curious, contradictory and compelling creatures. *Everyone is Interesting* operates with a deep awareness of the effects of connecting with others and the understanding that, in the right context, people will take care of even the most random stranger.

ADRIFT

Adrift takes root from seeds we planted a decade ago when we created Adrift in Gloucester, commissioned by the UK's JOLT International Theatre Festival. The Young Mammals and a group of local teens took to the streets with the goal of entering the lives of the people of Gloucester in meaningful ways. We helped a teen complete her homework, assisted seniors crossing the road, built a makeshift pergola for a local tandoori restaurant (at least attempted to) and documented the whole process.

Now, Adrift celebrates the spirit of these early interventions and builds upon our first Mammalian Assumption, which you should definitely know by now... everyone is interesting!

Mammalians with local emerging artists wander the streets, uncovering the unique experiences, skills and hobbies of the people that live, work, walk and roll in a specific part of town. Based on these encounters, we come up with socially-engaged participatory project ideas inspired by each and every person we meet. We then pitch these ideas to an audience to see if any of these ideas may bear fruit.



THE BOOK OF SPIN

All the world's a messaging app.

2024's most exciting missive was from Jack Nurse of Glasgow's Wonder Fools, who invited us to contribute to *Positive Stories* for Negative Times, a resource series for theatre kids looking for something a bit more exciting than reciting Shakespearean prose!

The result: an obsession with coming up with a (kinda) new instructional performance form designed to use a messaging applike WhatsApp—as a stage. We call this form Spin. The Book of Spin is a how-to guide for creating your own Spins, with examples and a starter kit for seeding your own little Mammalian Diving Reflex.

Best of all, we created it with the Mammals of Milan-Alba Qerimaj, Andrada Ciccotto, Chiara Prodi, Sara Ben Hamouda and Stefano Perlotta-joining Darren over WhatsApp to sort out exactly how this new form operates.



BREAK IT! MAKE IT! FAKE IT!

Break it! Make it! Fake it! emerged from our five-year Humboldting! adventure with students from the Thomas Mann Gymnasium in Berlin, Germany. Inside the halls of the Humboldt Forum, objects are carefully preserved and protected, but who or what really determines their value?

This multimedia live video performance was a collaboration with Aussie artists Rhian and Ivy Hinkley. Young people were handed the tools to break, smash, glue and reconstruct objects—transforming them into something entirely new. After the creative chaos, the re-imagined pieces were given a fictional backstory and auctioned off to the highest bidder, highlighting that many objects are only as valuable as the story you tell about them, with the big question: who gets to tell that story...?



PIGEONS, STRAWBERRIES, DILEMMAS

Pigeons, Strawberries, Dilemmas was a collaboration between the Taiwan-based collective, Prototype Paradise and our curious Humboldting! teens. The students delved into the behind-thescenes stories of employees keeping the Humboldt Forum welcoming, accessible and safe. With the audience guided by the youth, the conversations revealed the funny, intimate and quirky moments staff have experienced while working.

Pigeons, Strawberries, Dilemmas was a unique audio tour packed with small dramas and playful insights, including musings on controlling the pigeon population, how it *feels* to eat strawberry cake and shared memories of where the Palace of the Republic and the Berlin Palace once stood.

TENACIOUS TEEN TROPHIES

Have we mentioned how much we love Linda di Pietro? Linda is one of our incredible Italian champions, having programmed Teentalitarianism in Terni and Nightwalks with Teenagers in Bologna & Modena. Now at BASE in Milan, Linda reached out with a desire for us to propagate BASE's efforts in youth community outreach with a new, special project as part of their FAROUT Live Arts Festival.

Drawing inspiration from *The Children's Choice Awards, Tenacious* Teen Trophies burst forth as an intervention into the structure and institution of BASE's festival. Milanese teenagers were appointed the official Festival Jury, culminating in an awards ceremony where they presented hand-made trophies to the winners, all decided by them, and described in their own words.

The performance reshapes the social contract between young people, adult audiences and arts & cultural institutions. Critical viewpoints of teenagers are often relegated to the background, dismissed by adult artists, creative organizations, curators and media. Tenacious Teen Trophies gives teenagers the power to make executive decisions and actively take part in the arts and cultural landscape, providing weight and legitimacy to their essential viewpoints.

HAIRCUTS BY SENIORS

Inspired by "Haircuts by Octogenarians," a playing card of an imagined Mammalian performance in Patrick Blenkarn and Milton Lim's game Culture Capital, Haircuts by Seniors bloomed into an actual, real-life performance.

Haircuts by Seniors swept away the tired, false belief that older folks can't keep up. A spin on Haircuts by Children, Haircuts by Seniors was a 1970s-themed technicolour celebration of brilliance, inviting audiences to let go of their vanity and place their trust in the dexterity of seniors. In collaboration with Art+People in Brussels, Belgium, local seniors occupied two salons in the Marolles neighbourhood, transforming the street into a Saturday Night Fever dreamscape of bold patterns, disco lights, stacked vintage magazines and hair rollers for dayyyyys.

At its core, Haircuts by Seniors is a social exercise that addresses the isolation felt by our oldest and most vulnerable populations, offering an unconventional opportunity for intimate connections between unlikely strangers-and a fabulous haircut too-after all, they've been around long enough to know a thing or two about style.

WORKSHOPS

Creating a performance from scratch is time and labour intensive, which is why we also offer workshops directly to arts organizations and individual artists. These workshops exist to supply the intellectual tools that will spread our practice and ethos to as many artisticallyinclined people as possible. We have workshops for any budget, length of engagement and site-specific location.



COMPELLING **TELLING**

Compelling Telling is a masterclass designed for socially-engaged artists, community leaders, urban planners, social workers, educators, activists and individuals interested in using art to strengthen community ties. What began as a term-long teaching unit at Nelson-Mandela-Schule in Bochum, Germany has blossomed into an internationally delivered series, having taken place in Tunisia, the UK, Taiwan, China, Italy, Australia and Canada.

This hands-on workshop blends theoretical insights from complexity science with playful examples and real-world exercises. Moving with the Mammalian Assumption that everyone is generous and kind, participants test and nurture social relationships through artistic interventions, culminating in a small performance created in collaboration with local shop-owners.

THE HUMAN COLLIDER

The Human Collider is a simple yet powerful format. The concept is straightforward: bring together two very different populations and, together, do something unusual. Then, participants share the story of their collaboration on stage. We've used this format to produce bespoke experiences and performances, such as Adrift in Gloucester (2015), where high school drama students and hip-hop club members spent a week together offering help to anyone in the city who needed it. This formula has been central to works like Millionen! Millionen! Millionen! (2015), The Hemsbach Protocol (2016) and LOL100: The Life of Leaders in 100 Objects (2022).

EMERGENCE: PLANNING **THE UNPLANNABLE**

Emergence: Planning the Unplannable offers an engaging introduction to the science of complexity and its relevance with managing teams, leading organizations and navigating the complexities of one's career and personal life. Part motivational talk, part interactive workshop, Darren shares techniques for understanding complexity, change and making space for the unexpected to emerge. Designed for those ready to challenge old hierarchies, shake up routines, and cultivate diversity in ideas, perspectives and people, this workshop inspires meaningful transformation. Combining active participation with practical insights, Emergence: Planning the Unplannable is a "brains-on, feet-on" experience. Be prepared to move.

The City Streets Are Made for Fast Feet provides teenagers with a crash-course in socially-engaged practice through a series of Social High Intensity Interval Training (SHIIT) exercises. After the groundwork is set, participants are split into teams and sent into the heart of the city. They have one mission: create a transcendent moment of overwhelming beauty. Much like how muscle exhaustion builds strength, or confusion leads to clarity, making transcendent social moments requires a little bit of awkwardness - and a lot of heart. A building-block of Nightwalks with Teenagers, The City Streets Are Made for Fast Feet is a fast demonstration of the Mammalian Assumptions: everyone is generous, kind and interesting.

WORKS





Aiming for a 2025 premiere, *My Thing* \rightarrow *Your Thing* draws inspiration from our Humboldting! performance *Make It! Break it! Fake it!*, the spectacle of a live auction and spontaneous object creation.

The project is part of our long-term engagement with our emerging Young Mammals cohort in Ansan, South Korea: The Kids from Korea, and is being created with Australian artists Rhian and Ivy Hinkley, The Kids from Korea and a cohort of young people from Melbourne, Australia.

At first, we were searching for meaningful objects that community members were willing to give away; however, we quickly learned that separating people from their objects inherently diminishes the object's sentimental value. Our focus shifted to the community members themselves, with the goal of discovering the hobbies and skills that define their identities.

This process currently culminates in a unique marketplace where the young people and audiences collaborate to create objects, showcasing the skills that define them, while earning currency to take part in a competitive auction to bid for those very objects.

PLAYGROUNDS ON FIRE!

Playground's on Fire! will be an interactive experience in which a mixed hearing-anddeaf* audience must work together to douse the (not real) fires of a playground that just won't stop burning. To put the fire out, audiences have to come together to solve a series of puzzles, the clues for which are shared by a team of young people. The team can point, use sign language, emojis, and other creative methods to convey clues. There's just one rule: No spoken language!

This participatory performance is being developed by an intergenerational deaf/ hearing inclusive team in Berlin, Germany.

SPEED-DATING WITH CACTI


Speed-Dating with Cacti, while technically not a Mammalian project, is a production by Darren O'Donnell and Alice Fleming in collaboration with the Royal Botanic Gardens Victoria in Melbourne, Australia. Following the upcoming 2025 premiere, this performance will be tossed into Mammalian's touring repertoire.

Featuring Mahasi-style walking meditators, a dharma teacher, a botanist, a cognitive neuroscientist, an entomologist, a stand-up comedian, an 88-year-old woman with Alzheimers and a bunch of children chasing an ice-cream truck, *Speed-Dating with Cacti* asks the impossible to answer question: which species has the purest access to this present moment *riiiiight....NOW*?

In development since 2019, *Speed-Dating with Cacti* invites the audience on a meditative garden stroll through *bambusa vulgaris*, past *Dicksonia antarctica*, *Asplenium australasicum* and the very threatening *De Laubenfels' araucaria*, forcing audiences to come face-to-face with our own species' inevitable mortality and (among a few other of our succulent earthly cohabitants): *Echinopsis pachanoi*, a formidable cactus with a lot on his mind.

Coming soon to a patch of vegetation near you.

We, like almost every arts organization in this tumultuous post-pandemic financial landscape, are keenly focused on continuing to diversify our revenue streams to ensure a healthy, robust balance sheet. As we enter 2025, we are eager to harvest some of the new projects sowed during the phases of *Mammalian Droppings* and add them to our basket of touring projects, progressing the steady growth of our company in these uncertain financial times.


